I am pleased to present the Harrison Fire Rescue 2022 Annual Report. Last year, I touched on how technology has taken center stage and helped focuss our training due to the rapidly changing developments in technology. The theme revolved around how emergency services need to keep pace, ensuring safety for responders and the people we serve.

It comes with great pride and enthusiasm that I am able to report that the volunteers who make up Harrison Fire Rescue dedicated in excess of 1,949 hours

of training in 2022. That number does not include emergency call hours or meetings. Once those factors are figured into the equation, our people have worked over 9,116 hours! Impressive for a volunteer department.

Although the numbers are impressive, it's equally important to understand how we got there. Those hours come from ordinary members within our community who have regular full-time jobs and families. Individuals who believe helping others should be a priority for society and showcase it by volunteering to make a positive impact. People make the difference, and our diverse backgrounds, experience levels, and motivations are what make up our core values and foundational strength.

To maintain our level of service, we rely upon people like you. In 2022, Harrison Fire Rescue set another record by responding to 677 emergency calls. This trend is one we expect to continue. As we look to the future, we should anticipate factors that may play a role in our effectiveness. Specifically, the national trend in a decline of volunteer firefighters. As a proactive organization, we're looking to the future to ensure Harrison Fire Rescue not only has the right training, but more importantly, the right people. Your volunteers want to ensure Harrison Fire Rescue maintains its reputation as a top-notch service provider within the Fox Valley.



WE WANT YOU TO DO THIS

Each year, we have an opportunity to highlight an educational topic of importance. For 2022, let's focus on smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Alarm detectors have come a long way, and because of that, people have gotten complacent.

The old methodology was to replace detector batteries during daylight savings time changes. While many of you do, we're pretty sure most of you don't! Not casting blame here, as people tend to default to the detector itself (that annoying short chirp) for reminding us that the 9V battery needs replacing.

You may think replacing the battery means all is well. Unfortunately, that may not always be the case. Did you know that detectors have an expiration date? Yup, 10 years to be precise.

The home construction rate in our area is very high and although it only seems like a short time ago, many of the homes in our area are over 10 years old. PLEASE give your detector a slight twist and check the expiration date on the back. You may be surprised to learn what you find! Expired detectors are very prone to going off. Do you really want us to come at 3am to check for CO?
